Syllabus Math 01.503 - Number Theory

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

Math 01.503 Number Theory, 3 s.h.

This course studies the properties of integers in relation to addition and multiplication. Topics include: prime numbers, linear and polynomial congruences, the law of quadratic reciprocity, algebraic numbers and algebraic integers. Also included are topics related to well-known solved or unsolved problems in number theory, and some applications. This course may not be offered annually.

OBJECTIVES:

It is the purpose of this course to present to the student an introduction to an area of pure mathematics that, although it does not abound in practical application, has intrigued many curious minds in the general public, as well as the greatest mathematicians, from the time of the ancient Greeks to the present.

 - Primes
 - The fundamental theorem of arithmetic
