The Department of Psychology

Welcome to Psychology! The Psychology Department is housed within the College of Science and Mathematics and currently offers a BA in psychology (on the ground and online), BS in psychological science (in-person only), minor in psychology, concentration in behavioral services for children and their families, minor in neuroscience, and CUGS in I/O Psychology. In conjunction with Rowan Global Learning and Partnerships, we also offer a fully online BA in Psychology and 3+1 BA in Psychology options with Rowan College at Gloucester County and Rowan College at Burlington County. We also offer three masters programs (Clinical Mental Health Counseling, Applied Behavior Analysis, School Psychology) and a PhD in Clinical Psychology.

Mission Statement

The objectives of the Psychology Department are to provide its students with the opportunity to appreciate psychology as both a liberal academic science and as an applied art, to fulfill their professional ambitions, to develop integrity, to understand and appreciate diversity and multiculturalism in all that they learn and practice, and to learn the skills and values that will equip them to benefit others. Within the climate of a close knit academic community of learners and teachers, the Department offers coherent courses and programs of study in psychology at both the undergraduate and graduate level that are designed to give students the academic skills and knowledge they will need for reasoned inquiry, for the pursuit of advanced study, for a socially responsible service-oriented profession, for the development of a better understanding of social relationships and events, and for greater self-understanding.

Our Students

We currently serve 1300 BA majors, 60 BS majors, and 100 graduate students. Our graduates are employed in a variety of professions. Some of our recent graduates were employed by the following organizations: AT&T, Bancroft, Foster McKay, Maxim Behavior Services, New Behavior Network, and Twin Oaks. Our graduates have also attended a variety of graduate schools to earn degrees in Industrial/Organizational Psychology, Neuroscience, Human Factors, Social Work, Occupational/Physical Therapy, Experimental Psychology, Clinical Psychology, Mental Health Counseling, School Counseling, and Applied Behavior Analysis. Also, some of our recent graduates have attended the following graduate schools: Bowling Green State University, Boston University, King's College (London), North Carolina State University, Stony Brook University, Rutgers University, University of Houston, and Florida State University.

Bachelor of Science (BS) in Psychological Science

Curious about the science of the mind and behavior? Are you interested in conducting psychological research or continuing on in graduate school? Then the BS in Psychological Science degree is for you! The Bachelor of Science (BS) in Psychological Science is a degree designed for students who are interested in pursuing research-oriented careers such as experimental psychology (e.g., human factors, developmental, I/O, neuroscience, social & personality, quantitative) and clinical psychology (PhD). This degree program will also make you competitive for other non-research intensive graduate programs such as clinical mental health counseling and school psychology. We strive to make our students competitive for graduate school and industry by offering opportunities that will make them stand apart from the crowd.

Our curriculum is designed to provide our students with breadth and depth of knowledge in psychology as well as professional skills in research both inside and outside of the classroom. Along with other foundation courses, the degree requires a year-long research course sequence (i.e. Advance Research I and II) that provides students with the opportunity to conduct a human subjects research project from beginning to the end. The BS in Psychological Science major consists of 69 credits in psychology.

Students also have the opportunity to work closely with faculty mentors and peers to conduct research outside of the classroom either as a volunteer, for course credit (Research Clinic in Psychology) or paid through Federal Work Study funding. Our students have also presented their research at local, regional, national, and international conferences. Many of our majors also serve the department as learning assistants, peer mentors, and tutors in the Psychology Department.

**Please note that this degree is only offered in <u>a face-to-face traditional classroom setting</u>. While the degree can be completed on a part-time basis, the coursework is not offered at night. NeuroClub

The NeuroClub is an organization designated to create a network and support system which allows those interested in the Neuroscience field to gain knowledge, set themselves up for success, and communicate in a group of students with similar interests to learn and expand the field of Neuroscience. Members have the opportunity to hear from speakers, participate in community service events, and network with other students with similar interests in the Neuroscience field.

ABA Club

The purpose of the Applied Behavior Analysis Club is to give Rowan University students (undergraduate and graduate) information about the field of ABA through presentations, guest speakers, hands-on projects and more. This club seeks to serve the community by giving back and allowing anyone interested in this field a chance to learn more about what it offers.

Psych & Law Club

Psych and Law Club is an organization that brings together Rowan undergraduate students from different majors and focuses on bringing awareness to criminal justice reforms that are currently being spearheaded by psychologists in society.

Student Support Services

Want to be a student leader? Become a peer mentor, learning assistant, or tutor! Help out other majors navigate their way through psychology. You can get course credit for being a learning assistant and tutors are typically paid through the Tutoring Center.

Psychology Peer Mentors

Psychology Peer Mentors are upperclassmen psychology/psychological science majors who are trained to help first year freshman and transfer students' transition to the Rowan community and the Psychology major. Peer mentors are assigned to each incoming psychology major and serve as a bridge between Rowan psychology majors and their assigned faculty/professional academic advisor. Learning Assistants

Learning Assistants are upperclassmen psychology/psychological science majors that help facilitate small group learning in the classroom. Our LAs are typically assigned to Statistics in Psychology and Research Methods in Psychology. LAs are typically volunteers or take as course credit which counts as a psychology elective. Graduate School Planning

There are so many options for graduate school in psychology that students often get overwhelmed and don't even know where to begin. I recommend first deciding on what you ultimately want to do. Do you want to be a full-time therapist? Do you want to go into academia? Do you want to work in industry that would require some graduate training? Do you want to work with children involved with Child Protective Services? Do you want/need a PhD, PsyD, EdD, MA, MS, LPC, LSW, LCSW, MeD, MFT, MD, DO, PT, OT, JD and the list goes on. Graduate school could cost you a lot of money (e.g. PsyD, MA, MS) or you could get paid to go (e.g. PhD). So you want to make sure that you're getting the degree (and experiences) you need that is appropriate for the career you want.

Getting accepted into graduate school is not like getting into undergrad. The process is different and <u>MUCH MORE COMPETITIVE</u>! Students often don't realize how competitive it is. For example, many of our students want to get a PhD in clinical psychology (a very common goal among our majors). However, most students don't realize that only about <u>2%</u> of students who apply actually get accepted into a clinical PhD program. That can be very discouraging! However, students also don't realize that there are other options and that a clinical psychology PhD may not be the degree that's actually necessary to do what you want to do.

Getting into Graduate School

What do I need to do to be accepted into graduate school? Below is a list of the <u>top 5</u> things graduate schools are looking for from applicants. Please look at the admission criteria for each program though; this list will vary.

- <u>High GPA</u>: Typically schools will have admissions criteria on their website. Most graduate programs have a <u>GPA minimum</u> of between 3.0 and 3.5. Remember, that's a *MINIMUM* so keep that GPA up.
- 2. <u>High GRE scores (or GMAT, MCAT, LSAT</u>): The exam you need to take will be specified by the school you're applying to. Students will often start studying for this exam their Junior year and take it at least once prior to the start of your senior year (or before the fall/spring you'll be applying to graduate school). That way you can take it again if your scores aren't high enough. Many schools have removed the GRE requirement.
- 3. <u>Excellent letters of recommendation</u>: Typically schools will ask for 2-3 letters of recommendation. At least **ONE** should be from a professor at Rowan.
- 4. <u>Research Experience</u>: This depends on what type of program you're applying to; however, research experience never hurts! You'll work on your critical thinking, writing, and oral communication skills which are valuable for any career path you choose. The BS degree has research experience built in. We recommend joining a faculty member's lab to get great experience. - 5. Field Experience (or internship): Again, depending on the program you're applying to they may expect to see that you've had exposure to the population that you're interested in working with in graduate school and beyond (e.g. adults with severe mental illness, children on the spectrum, shadowing a guidance counselor, etc...). Many of our majors do a Field Experience for credit. Contact Dr. Lamastro for an application form. It is recommended that you apply at least 1 semester before you want it!

Don't forget extracurricular activities too like membership in honor societies and clubs/organizations, awards, volunteer experience, other work experience, etc.

You'll learn more about applying to graduate school in your Psychology of Profession and Practice course. Also, be on the lookout for free workshops on applying to graduate school sponsored by our student groups.
