## Action & Advocacy

### Autism Legislation Passed!

On August 13, 2009, Governor Jon Corzine signed the new legislation that requires many insurance companies to cover the screening and therapeutic treatment for children, up to age 21, who are diagnosed with autism and other developmental disabilities. The ceremony was hosted by PSE&G's Children's Hospital and was represented by Autism New Jersey and more than 200 individuals including families, children with autism, and professionals.

The legislation, A-2238/S-1561, states insurance companies will be required cover up to \$36,000 annually to pay for treatments such as Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) therapy, occupational, physical, and speech therapy. The legislation is scheduled to take effect in February 2010. New Jersey will be the 15th state to enact this law.

### 27<sup>th</sup> Annual Autism NJ Conference



Autism New Jersey's (formerly COSAC) Annual Conference was held in Atlantic City on October 8<sup>th</sup>-10<sup>th</sup>. Students from Rowan's Applied Behavior Analysis programs volunteered and attended the conference, which is one of the largest autism-related conferences of its kind, reaching more than 1,400 caregivers, professionals, and parents. The conference displayed the work of several prominent behavior analysts currently practicing in New Jersey through a variety of workshops. A highlight of the conference was an address given by Governor Corzine addressing the current status of the autism-related legislation in the state of New Jersey. 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## Profile of a Placement: The Y.A.L.E. School Southeast



The Y.A.L.E. School Southeast Autism Program is a private school providing year-round, full-day educational programming to students ages 3-21 with a diagnosis of Autism or Pervasive Developmental Disorder-Not Otherwise Specified. A small student-to-staff ratio (either 1:1 or 2:1) provides students with the necessary structure, engagement and supervision to achieve social, academic and behavioral success. In addition to the main campus in Voorhees, NJ, the Y.A.L.E. School Southeast Autism Program also has two satellite campuses providing behavior analytic services to students in the Hamilton Township area (students ages 3-7) and the Audubon area (students ages 14-21). Both of these satellite campuses are housed in public schools and are directly supervised by a BCBA from the main campus in Voorhees.

The Y.A.L.E. School Southeast Autism Program is based on the principles and practices of Applied Behavior Analysis and employs a variety of behavior analytic strategies and procedures in order to increase academic and social behaviors and decrease disruptive or inappropriate behaviors. These strategies and procedures include, but are not limited to, the application of Skinner's functional analysis of language, discrete trial instruction, small group instruction, errorless teaching, incidental teaching, activity schedules, individualized schedules of reinforcement, functional behavior assessments, analogue functional analyses, and computer-based instruction. The Y.A.L.E. School Southeast Autism Program features a comprehensive curriculum focusing on academic achievement and independence. This curriculum is tailored for each individual student's needs and based on the results of behavior analytic assessments (i.e., The ABLLS, The VB-MAPP). The program also features on-site, highly trained professional staff, including two Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBA). The two BCBA's provide full time supervision and training for all Y.A.L.E. School Southeast staff. These supervising behavior analysts also oversee curriculum development, all functional behavior assessments, analogue functional analyses and the creation and implementation of all individualized behavior plans.

Practicum students completing hours at Y.A.L.E. School Southeast will be provided with a variety of activities and experiences based on each student's level of education, training and experience. These activities include direct observation, data collection (skill acquisition, functional behavior assessment, Interobserver Agreement and procedural integrity data), implementation of Y.A.L.E. School Southeast teaching procedures, assistance in analogue functional analyses, assistance in the creation of individualized behavior plans, staff training for the implementation of behavior plans, and direct meetings with the BCBA's to review clinical experience and current literature.
