

Rowan's 2nd Annual Conference on Autism

On March 11th, Rowan hosted the 2nd Annual Conference on Autism. This year, the conference was held at the Holiday Inn Select in Bridgeport, NJ. The keynote speaker was renowned behavior analyst Dr. Mark Sundberg. Dr. Sundberg is the co-author of the books Teaching Language to Children with Autism or Other Developmental Disabilities, The Assessment of Basic Language and Learning Skills: The ABLLS, and A Collection of Reprints on Verbal Behavior. He is the founder and past editor of the journal The Analysis of Verbal Behavior, and author of the The Verbal Behavior Milestones Assessment and Placement Program: The VB-MAPP. In addition to Dr. Sundberg's workshops, five additional workshops on topics related to education, behavior analysis, and autism were available. The Center for Behavior Analysis provided BACB[®] continuing education credits for the workshops on the behavior analytic track of the conference. As a follow up to Dr. Sundberg's presentation, the Psychology Department at Rowan is offering a special topics graduate course in Summer 2011 on Verbal Behavior and the VB-MAPP designed specifically for teachers.

Revised Procedures: Oral Exam

As our programs grow, we continue to improve our procedures. Starting Spring 2011, the procedures for the oral exam have changed.

Who? Students graduating that semester from MA and CAGS in ABA Program.
What? The exam is mapped from the BACB Task List upon which the curriculum is based. Some questions are written and some oral.

When? Three times a year (spring, summer, & fall) corresponding to the semester of graduation.

How? The faculty will provide a review session at least 4 weeks prior to the scheduled exam. When students arrive for the exam, they will be given 19 short answer, written questions and 5 scenarios. Students have 75 minutes to complete the written questions and to prepare for the oral examination. The oral examination is 30 minutes. In the oral exam, you will be asked 10 questions and be asked for your formulation for the 5 scenarios. Passing is considered 75 out of 100 points. If you do not pass the first time, you will be given specific feedback about your performance and areas that you need to improve. You will be asked to meet individually with Drs, Kerwin & Soreth and you will be scheduled for a second exam.

Changes in MA & CAGS in ABA Effective Summer 2011

Changes to the Specialization & Post-Bac Programs Effective Fall 2011

The Behavior Analyst Certification Board[®] (BACB) recently proposed required changes to the coursework for the BCaBA certification by adding 45 classroom hours of coursework (one 3 credit hour course) in Ethics and Professional Conduct. As a result, we are changing the structure of the Specialization and Post-Baccalaureate Certificate programs to comply with the board's requirements for certification.

<u>Specialization</u>: Students graduating after May 2012 will no longer be required to take the Field Experience course (you may choose to take it as a free elective course) and will instead be required to take a new course entitled "Professional Issues in ABA." Students graduating in May 2012 must complete either the Field Experience course OR the Professional Issues course in order to graduate.

<u>Post-Bac</u>: For all Post-Bac students a new course, "Professional Issues in ABA" will now be required to complete the program. This change increases the program from 9 to 12 required credits (3 to 4 courses).

Students under the old program model will have until December 2013 to complete the programs under the current model approved by the BACB. The BACB will begin testing using the new 4th Edition Task List with the first examination administration of 2015, and will discontinue testing on the 3rd Edition Task List content with the last examination administration of 2014.
